Endoscopy case of the month: Drs McGinty and Petersen prevent a dog from needing surgery



Tess, a 10 year old female German Shepard, presented to Dr McGinty recently for a 3 day history of vomiting bile fluid 1-2 times per day. Tess still had a good appetite and was acting normal otherwise. The owners did report that there was a piece of a bedding sheet missing and that Tess may have eaten it. Dr McGinty decided to take x-rays which revealed foreign material within the stomach. From there, and before

performing a potentially painful and expensive abdominal surgery, he decided that there might be a chance that he could remove the foreign material under anesthesia with our endoscope (a tubular camera that can visualize the stomach without pain and has a working channel in which to pass instruments down into the stomach). With the assistance of Dr Petersen, the 2 doctors were able to visualize the esophagus and stomach which revealed a piece of colored bedding sheet within the stomach near the entrance into the small intestine. The fabric was removed via special graspers. The procedure was completed within 30 minutes and Tess was able to go home that same day. She recovered quickly and uneventfully. We are so happy to be able to offer endoscope procedures for our patients that, at times, can replace more painful, and expensive procedures, and allow a faster recovery time. The Importance of Senior Pet Care

It is very important for senior pets to be examined by your veterinarian twice per year, every 6 months, since pets age much faster than people do. Cats and dogs are considered senior pets when they are 8 years of age and older.

It is important for the doctor to monitor your pet's weight as changes in weight may indicate an illness or disease. When we see our pets every day, it may be difficult to notice a change in your pet's weight.



It is also very important for the doctor to perform a physical exam and to listen to our senior pet's hearts. Changes in heart rate may indicate an illness or disease. The doctor will also be able to hear if there are any abnormalities with the heart such as a heart murmur or arrhythmia.

A lot of senior pets experience arthritis. The doctor is able to palpate this age change

through a physical exam and can prescribe joint supplements or pain medications, as well as perform cold laser therapy to help alleviate pain and inflammation.

Some illnesses that are experienced by our senior pets that can be found during an exam: hyperthyroidism, hypothyroidism, diabetes, liver infection, heart and lung changes, arthritis, early detection of cancerous masses, discovery of diseased, loose or fractured teeth. Dog Owners: FDA Releases an Alert About Grain Free Diets



The FDA launched an investigation into potential links between canine heart disease and diet — specifically grain-free diets. The FDA is investigating a potential dietary link between canine dilated cardiomyopathy (DCM) and dogs eating certain grain-free pet foods. The foods of concern are those containing legumes such as peas or lentils, other legume seeds, or potatoes listed as primary ingredients. The FDA began investigating this matter after it received reports of DCM in dogs that had been eating these diets for a period of months to years. DCM itself is not considered rare in dogs, but these reports are unusual because the disease occurred in breeds of dogs not typically prone to the disease.

Dilated cardiomyopathy (DCM) is a type of canine heart disease that affects the heart muscle. The hearts of dogs with DCM have a decreased ability to pump blood, which often results in congestive heart failure. Some breeds, especially large and giant breeds, have a predisposition to DCM. These breeds include Doberman Pinschers, Great Danes, Newfoundlands, Irish Wolfhounds, and Saint Bernards. While DCM is less common in medium and small breeds, English and American Cocker Spaniels are also predisposed to this condition. When early reports from the veterinary cardiology community indicated that recent, atypical cases in breeds like Golden Retrievers, Labrador Retrievers,

Whippets, Bulldogs, and Shih Tzus all that consistently ate grain alternatives in their diets, the FDA took notice. Currently, there is no proof that these ingredients are the cause of DCM in a broader range of dogs, but dog owners should be aware of this alert from the FDA. The FDA continues to work with veterinary cardiologists and veterinary nutritionists to better understand the effect, if any, of grain-free diets on dogs.



There has also been an update to the research on DCM and emphasized the issue is not just grain-free diets. The suspected diets are called "BEG" diets (boutique companies, exotic ingredients, or grain-free diets).

The possible link between BEG diets and DCM may be due to ingredients used to replace grains in grain-free diets, such as lentils or chickpeas, but also may be due to other common ingredients commonly found in BEG diets, such as exotic meats, vegetables, and fruits.

Although there appears to be an association between DCM and BEG diets, the relationship has not yet been proven, and other factors may be equally or more important.





It would be like if you got a prescription medication from a Hy-Vee Pharmacy, and the pharmacy sold you a medication that was kept in a hot car a few days ago or was accidentally spilled on the floor and was placed back in the container and returned to the pharmacy.
